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A Message from Superintendent Hanlon



Dear Hilltopper Community,

The Chardon Local School District commits to high achievement for all students. We strive to be a model school district by 2028.

These district vision and mission statements are found in our 2023–2028 Success Plan. These are goals we strive to achieve every day. We can only accomplish these through the hard work of our students, staff and Hilltopper community.

At Chardon Schools, we seek to keep our community informed with regular updates as to our work and progress towards achieving our mission and the goals that define our vision for our schools. This annual Quality Profile is a communications tool designed to celebrate the exemplary programs and activities offered in our school district that form the foundation of an exceptional educational experience for students.

The Chardon Local School District's Quality Profile is supported by the Alliance for High Quality Education and provides a snapshot of the accomplishments of our students and staff throughout the 2023–24 school year. It also provides community members important information regarding district finances, extracurricular activities and business affairs.

The report is meant to be read in combination with the Local Report Card developed by the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce. The overall score is based on state assessment performance with five rated components: Achievement, Progress, Gap Closing, Graduation Rate and Early Literacy.

For the 2023–24 school year, Chardon Local Schools received 4.5 out of 5 stars on its state report card, as well as a performance index score of 101.9, which ranks 50th among all public school districts in Ohio.

Scores from throughout our district included:

- Munson Elementary: 5 star rating, 104.2 performance index score;
- Park Elementary: 5 star rating, 101.1 performance index score;
- Chardon Middle School: 5 star rating, 103.6 performance index score;
- Chardon High School: 4.5 star rating, 100.6 performance index score.

Chardon Schools' overall rating of 4.5 stars means the district "exceeds state standards," in the overall measurement. It provides a snapshot of our district's success while also highlighting areas for further growth.

Our community deserves to see high value for its investment in the district.



Projected Revenue, Expenditures, and Cash Balance



This chart shows Chardon Local Schools' predicted revenue (money coming in), expenditures (money going out) and cash balance (money left over) from 2023 to 2028.

- TOTAL REVENUE (Gray Bars): This is the money the district expects to receive each year from taxes, state funding, and other sources.
- TOTAL EXPENDITURE (Red Bars): This is how much Chardon Schools expect to spend each year on things like salaries, facilities, and programs.
- CASH BALANCE (Black Line): This shows how much money will be left over at the end of each year after revenue is received and expenses are paid.

The cash balance is dropping each year, meaning that by 2028, the schools will have \$4.6 million left in savings.


Why is a levy projected for 2027?

The district currently projects an operating levy may be needed in 2027 because while spending continues to rise, income is not increasing at the same rate. This means Chardon Schools will have less funds saved up each year. Without the levy, the district may run out of funds soon after 2028.



HONORS DIPLOMAS 84 students earned Academic Honors Diplomas by meeting at least seven of these eight criteria: four units each of math, science (including two advanced) and social studies; three units of one world language or two each of two languages; one unit of fine arts; a GPA of 3.5 or higher; and an ACT score of 27 or higher or an SAT score of 1280 or higher.

COLLEGE BOARD SCHOLARSHIP RECOGNITION PROGRAM

Five students were named National Rural and Small Town Scholars, and one earned National Hispanic Scholar recognition.

Eligibility requires taking the Fall 2023 PSAT/NMSQT or Spring PSAT 10 and scoring in the top 10% in their state, or earning scores of 3+ on two AP exams by 10th grade, plus a GPA of 3.3 or higher. Students must also identify as first-generation, Black or African American, Hispanic or Latino, Indigenous or Native and/or attend school in a rural area or small town.

Chardon High School (CHS) excels in academics and athletics, consistently surpassing state and national averages on the ACT, SAT, and AP exams. Ranked in the top 7% of Ohio high schools by U.S. News & World Report in 2024, CHS offers a robust academic program supported by a variety of enrichment opportunities.

Students can choose from regular, honors, and 17 AP courses, as well as programs like Independent Study, College Credit Plus, and Auburn Career Center's 20 specialized offerings. In 2024, 227 students took 432 AP exams, with 70% earning scores of 3 or higher, including 65 AP Scholars. The school's average ACT composite score was 20.9.

CHS provides extensive student support through senior mentorship programs, guided study halls, and math labs, ensuring academic success for all learners. Beyond the classroom, students engage in 50+ clubs, performing arts, and 20 varsity sports, fostering well-rounded development and leadership skills.

Chardon Early Learning Center is a Step Up to Quality gold rated program. The district offers a full continuum of services including general education preschool classrooms, integrated classrooms and special education classrooms. CELC preschool staff conduct developmental screenings and work with families to provide intervention services to students ages 3–5 who have been identified as having a disability. CELC preschool staff also provide support to providers and students in community preschools and daycare centers.

The school's Kindergarten classes are in an all-day, everyday format and include world language, art, music, physical education and technology. The preschool and kindergarten have benefited from being the recipient of the Ohio Comprehensive State Literacy Grant, focusing on the science of reading.

Business Affairs

ur business affairs department oversees construction projects, plans capital improvement projects including needed repairs to classrooms and buildings, as well as recommending methods to improve the efficiency and cost effectiveness of operations. Work in business affairs also encompasses food service, technology and transportation.

FACILITIES

Capital Improvements at a glance:

- Initial work on the new transportation/business affairs complex on Washington Street;
- Installation of the new security vestibule at Chardon High School;
- Replacement of lights with energy efficient LED Fixtures at Chardon Memorial Field;
- Installation of a new gymnasium floor at Chardon Middle School;
- Replacement of scoreboards at the CHS gym;
- Installation of outdoor, Daktronics digital signage at CHS and CMS;

- Parking lot improvements at CHS, CMS, Chardon Early Learning Center and Munson Elementary;
- Installation of new windows on the east elevation of the 100s and 300s at CHS;
- Classroom improvements, including the replacement of tile flooring, the installation of new windows and shades and the painting of walls in six classrooms at CMS and two at CHS;
- Replacement of gutters at CELC;
- Installation of a new travel curtain in the auditorium of Park Elementary;
- Installation of new exterior doors at CHS Makerspace, kitchen loading dock and boiler room.

he Chardon Transportation department's highest priority is the safe transport of students every day of the academic year, traversing a total area of 88 square miles. In addition to routine transportation, the department is responsible for non-routine transportation, including field trips and extracurricular activities, averaging over 450 non-routine excursions per school year.

- An additional 12-school bus fleet operated by Cardinal Local School District and maintained by Chardon's three on-site district mechanics through a shared-service maintenance program
- 527,187 miles traveled for routine routes, excludes field trips and extracurricular events



LEVERAGING TECHNOLOGY FOR ENHANCED SAFETY AND EFFICIENCY:

- Maintenance software to track service, inventory and fuel consumption.
- BusRight interactive application for parents to securely access their student's routing information.
- BusRight tablets mounted securely in the driver area with route information to aid substitute drivers.
- Transpar ticketing system to provide consistency in recording, tracking and tabulating issues and concerns resulting in more efficient office operations.
- One new 78-passenger school bus and one new 18 passenger school bus with a wheelchair lift to replace aging vehicles.

FNS is determined to evolve the school meal program and continually elevate our schools.

FNS will strive to:

- Maintain the highest nutritional standards and quality for school meals.
- Continuously maintain the directives of the Dietary Guidelines for Americans.
- Increase the variety, visibility, and accessibility of unprocessed fresh fruit and vegetables whenever possible.
- Offer local food choices whenever possible.
- Continue to provide at least one vegetarian option at each meal in the school meal program.
- Incorporate student and parent input with the nutritional improvements.

We have implemented our new Nutrition Services software Health-e-Pro, which provides easy access to our menus along with nutritional information and an allergy filter. Our menus are posted on the Chardon Food Service website and also include a mobile app, "My School Menus" (available for Android and Apple Devices).
