



SCHOOL FACILITIES PROGRAM

BACKGROUND

- Partnered with Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC) in 2016
 - evaluate existing school facilities
 - complete an enrollment projection
 - develop a long-term master plan concept for the Chardon community
- Enrollment has returned to levels last seen in the 1980's and projected to continue to decline
- All existing school facilities evaluated and recommended for replacement based on projected renovation costs being higher than two-thirds of the cost to replace facilities
- OFCC completed 9 possible master plan options considered by the district's Facilities Advisory Committee





SCHOOL FACILITIES PROGRAM

BACKGROUND

- District enrollment projections updated March 2019
- OFCC Cost Model updated for 2020 construction estimation
- Board of Education engaged Burges and Burges Strategists to complete due diligence
 - Conducted 16 In-depth interviews
 - Held 5 Focus Group Listening Sessions (Staff, Administrators, Parents & Community Members)
 - Completed an Online Community Survey of stakeholders n=1,023
 - Statistically-valid Telephone Survey of Community n=300
- Board of Education approved a November 2019 bond issue request




QUALITY OF EDUCATION

KEY FINDINGS

- 74% of respondents rated the quality of education in Chardon Schools as Excellent or Good.
- 90% of parent respondents rated the quality of education in Chardon Schools as Excellent or Good.

QUALITY OF EDUCATION

A LOOK AT THE TREND OVER THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS

- Voters' assessment of the trajectory of public education in the district over the past few years. Overall, 36% say things have improved, 13% say they have declined, 27% say they are the same, and a substantial 24% don't know.
- While no more than 20% of any subgroup think things have declined, there is notable variation between those who think things are improving, staying the same, or don't know.
- Groups most likely to see an upswing are Chardon, CLSD parents, and age 18-49.
- Groups most likely to think things are staying the same are Chardon, bond issue supporters, and age 50-64.
- Groups who don't know at higher than average rates on this question are Hambden, undecideds on the bond issue, and age 65+.

CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS

PERCEPTIONS OF OUR SCHOOL FACILITIES

- About three-in-ten voters are unable to rate the condition of the elementary school buildings, middle school, or high school.
- 3% say the district's elementary schools are in good condition, 27% say they need minor repairs, 17% say they need major repairs, and 21% say they need to be replaced.
- 37% of CLSD parents and 40% of bond issue supporters say the elementary schools need to be replaced.
- 60% of bond issue opponents say the elementary schools are in good condition or need only minor repairs.
- 52% of undecideds and 45% of voters age 65+ can't rate the condition of the elementary schools.
- Overall, 6% say the middle school is in good condition, 26% say it needs minor repairs, 16% say it needs major repairs, and 20% say it needs to be replaced.
- 38% of both CLSD parents and bond supporters say the middle school needs to be replaced.


CONDITION OF THE SCHOOLS

PERCEPTIONS OF OUR SCHOOL FACILITIES

- 57% of bond opponents say the condition of the middle school is good or that it only needs minor repairs.
- A near majority of 49% of undecideds don't know about the condition of the middle school.
- 45% of voters age 65+ are also unable to rate the middle school's condition.
- 6% of voters say the high school is in good condition, 23% say it needs minor repairs, 16% say it needs major repairs, and 27% say it needs to be replaced. The demographic patterns mirror those above.
- CLSD parents and bond supports are the most likely to call for the high school to be replaced.
- Undecideds and seniors are the least able to rate the high school's condition.
- A majority of opponents think the high school is good or only needs minor repairs.


Q.15-17 CONDITION OF SCHOOLS

Elementary Middle High school









ESTIMATED MILLAGE RATES

What is a mill?

A unit of taxation used to calculate property tax.



Example:

\$100,000 <u>Market Value</u> X 35% = \$35,000 <u>Assessed Value</u>

\$35,000 <u>Assessed Value</u> X .001 <u>one mill</u> = \$35/year

One mill equals \$35/year in taxes paid on \$100,000 in Market Value

PHASES ONE A&B ESTIMATED MILLAGE

Using \$100,000 MV & 5.30 mills for 37 years

\$35,000 AV × .00530 (5.30 mills)

\$185.50/year/\$100,000 MV

\$15.45/month/\$100,000 MV

MV = Market Valuation

AV = Assessed Valuation

PHASES ONE A&B ESTIMATED MILLAGE

5.30 mills for 37 years

Examples using other property valuations

\$100,000 MV home \$185.50/year

\$200,000 MV home \$371.00/year

\$300,000 MV home \$556.50/year
